from Father Devine...

CHANGE

We live in a world of CHANGE, and CHANGE demands a response...think of this -- bushes have to be pruned every year, they aren't just fully formed once and for all; cars and property have to be continually maintained and kept in good condition...not just cleaned once for all. Time passes, and our bodies grow older - they change - we move along. Things we never dreamed would change, sometimes do – at least temporarily, sometimes permanently.

CHANGE...What response are you making to it?

--in body

- regular and prudent doctor visits with medical consultation, if possible
- learn about whatever changes may happen to us as we get older...import of sound retirement planning, consulting with professionals, if necessary

--in soul

- while God does not change...people (i.e., the Church) do...we have seen a Church forced to face and admit that fact...the Church has done so with her magnificent blueprint for late 20th century life (and beyond) known as Vatican Council II - and yet how many of us are *unfamiliar* with that blueprint, and also The other plans that have followed, and built upon it!!!

****Make no mistake about it - - We are a Church of the Council. In such a Church, we...**

- continue to learn - no matter how old we are,
- stand ready to treasure our unchanging faith in new and developing ways
- do not automatically hold on to what we once knew, just because we once knew it, or that's the way we always did things,
- are sensitive not only to people's needs, but also to what the Church teaches, and would have us practice,
- renew our baptism promises every year, and live them every day.

(The Church) also maintains that beneath all that changes there is much that is unchanging, much that has its ultimate foundation in Christ, who is the same yesterday, and today, and forever.

THE WATERS OF BAPTISM

When new sod is put in, it needs constant saturation with water. Landscapers say that this “knits” the sod to the soil. The same when a branch is grafted onto a tree: the poultice that joins them at the splice must be kept wet at all times. Water is the stuff that binds the very cells of our bodies together. No wonder religions throughout all times and cultures have used it so prominently. When Jesus stepped into the Jordan for baptism, he “knit” himself to what had come before him. By going to the Jordan, he made himself one with the people of Israel who had crossed it into their Promised Land. With John the Baptist, Christ wove himself into the prophetic tradition that heralded the coming reign of God. He had become fully human in the waters of Mary’s womb, and by partaking in the rite of the baptism of repentance, Jesus identified himself with our sinful, frail humanity. It is through the waters of baptism that Christ continues to graft new members onto his Body, the Church; through these waters we are cleansed from sin and filled with the promise of grace, given our destiny for eternal life. For us, as for Jesus, it is also the waters of baptism that inaugurate our mission to proclaim the Good News.

AN ANCIENT BAPTISTERY

One of the most ancient and enduring sites for baptism in Rome is the church of San Giovanni in Fonte. This church is in fact a baptistery, and houses the font for the Lateran Basilica, the cathedral of Rome. The Emperor Constantine sponsored its construction in the year 315, and it is therefore the oldest baptistery in the world. It is the model for nearly all later baptisteries, including perhaps the font in your own parish church.

Sunday Morning Religious Education at St. Mark Church Campus

Have you ever wondered just what we teach in Religious Education?

St. Mark's Catechist are dedicated parishioners of St. Mark church who work hard to provide assistance to parents as they pass down our faith to their children. Our Catechists provide in-person instruction before the 10:30 Mass in the St. Mark's parish center classrooms. Classes include content from the Christ Our Life Series and hands-on activities to help foster our faith and knowledge of Catholicism. Because of Covid, all Sunday morning classes have moved to a homeschooling format where parents are teaching their children with email support from the Catechist. Once the dispensation has been removed and we believe it is safe, we will be returning to in-person instruction. One of the best outcomes of teaching classes on Sunday before Mass is that we can incorporate the Mass into many of the classes. Once each year a specific class is featured and Father blesses an item for each student.

Children learn Biblical citations and a general overview of the Bible | Psalms <i>Memorare</i> to the Blessed Virgin Mastery of Biblical Citations |
| 7 | Devoted to the study of God's saving love as it is revealed through his Son, Jesus. Designed to help young adolescents grow in their knowledge of Jesus, so that they may love him more ardently and serve him more generously.
